*in a sweeping analysis of religion in the post civil war and twentieth century south freedom s coming puts race and culture at the center describing southern protestant cultures as both priestly and prophetic as southern formal theology sanctified dominant political and social hierarchies evangelical belief and practice subtly undermined them the seeds of subversion paul harvey argues were embedded in the passionate individualism exuberant expressive forms and profound faith of believers in the region harvey explains how black and white religious folk within and outside of mainstream religious groups formed a southern evangelical counterculture of christian interracialism that challenged the theologically grounded racism pervasive among white southerners and ultimately helped to end jim crow in the south moving from the folk theology of segregation to the women who organized the montgomery bus boycott from the hymn inspired freedom songs of the 1960s to the influence of black pentecostal preachers on elvis presley harvey deploys cultural history in fresh and innovative ways and fills a decades old need for a comprehensive history of protestant religion and its relationship to the central question of race in the south for the postbellum and twentieth century period*

emancipation and the citizenship that followed conferred upon former slaves the right to create family relationships that were sanctioned recognized and regulated by the laws that governed the families of all american citizens elizabeth regosin explores what the acquisition of this legal familial status meant to former slaves personally socially and politically the civil war pension system offers a fascinating source of documentation for this study of ex slave families in transition from slavery to freedom because the provisions made to compensate eligible union veterans and surviving family members created a vast bureaucracy pension officials required and verified extensive proof of qualification former slaves were obliged to reproduce and represent the inner workings of their familial relationships regosin reveals through both their personal histories and pension narratives how former slaves constructed identities as individuals and as family members while they negotiated the boundaries of family as defined by the pension system the stories told by ex slaves their witnesses and the government officials who played a role in the pension process all serve to provide us with a richer understanding of life for newly emancipated african americans

the border states during the civil war have long been ignored or misunderstood in general histories this book corrects that oversight explaining how many border state residents used wartime realities to redefine their politics and culture as southern by studying the characteristics of those positioned along this fault line during the civil war the centrality of the war issue of slavery which border residents long eschewed as being divisive became apparent this book explains how the process of southernization occurred during and after the civil war a phenomenon largely unexplained by historians beyond the broader more traditional narrative of the clash of arms within these border slave states raged an inner civil war that shaped the military and political outcomes of the war as well as these states cultural landscapes author christopher phillips describes how the civil war experience in the border states served to form new loyalties and communities of identity that both deeply divided these states and distorted the meaning of the war for postwar generations

compelling and enlightening this collection of primary source documents allows twenty first century students to direct dial key figures in african american history it includes concise and perceptive commentary along with engaging suggestions for discussion and project work examines key themes from multiple perspectives features a diverse range of voices that cut across class and political affiliations as well as across regions and generations chronological and thematic coverage from emancipation to the current day primary source documents include everything from letters and speeches to photographs rap lyrics and newspaper reports incorporates recent as well as traditional historical interpretations classroom ready text which includes keynotes on documents differentiated material and engaging discussion questions

one historian s journey to find the end of the civil war and along the way to expand our understanding of the nature of war itself and how societies struggle to draw the line between war and peace we set out on the james river march 25 1865 aboard the paddle steamboat river queen president lincoln is on his way to general grant s headquarters at city point virginia and he s decided he won t return to washington until he s witnessed or perhaps even orchestrated the end of the civil war now it turns out more than a century and a half later historians are still searching for that end was it april 9 at appomattox as conventional wisdom holds where lee surrendered to grant in wilmer mclean s parlor or was it ten weeks afterward in galveston where a federal commander proclaimed juneteenth the end of slavery or perhaps in august of 1866 when president andrew johnson simply declared the insurrection is at an end that the answer was elusive was baffling even to a historian of the stature of michael vorenberg whose work served as a key source of steven spielberg s lincoln vorenberg was inspired to write this groundbreaking book finding its title in the peace lincoln hoped for but could not make before his assassination a peace that required not one but many endings as vorenberg reveals in these pages the most important of which came well more than a year after lincoln s untimely death to say how a war ends is to suggest how it should be remembered and vorenberg s search is not just for the civil war s endpoint but for its true nature and legacy so essential to the american identity it s also a quest in our age of forever wars to understand whether the united states s interminable conflicts of the current era have a precedent in the civil war and whether in a sense wars ever end at all or merely wax and wane

the university of alabama was burned to the ground in the final days of the civil war in the war s aftermath survivors constructed a new collection of buildings using many of the bricks left from the original campus nevertheless the university s presidency changed frequently alabama had a new egalitarian constitution created by a racially diverse coalition of republicans the fate of the university of alabama soon became a key battleground in the contested nature of state assuming control of the university shortly before its formal reopening the new state board of education dismissed the previous regime s chosen faculty replacing them with idealistic republican outsiders in a firestorm of controversy that set the stage for further conflicts to come inflamed by reactionary rabble rousers tuscaloosa became a notorious hotbed of intimidation and violence against radical republicanism african americans and the university of alabama where a series of short lived presidencies financial crises brutal threats fabricated controversies and a

*dwindling student body came to symbolize alabama s complicated reconstruction experience in the public eye as the university s leaders struggled to shore up its fortunes democratic interests abetted by the ku klux klan began to regain political power leveraging the university s difficulties as a trojan horse to recapture the governor s office in 1870 this splintered republican led reformist efforts and initiated the steady reconsolidation of elite white power across the state including the university of alabama in the battle for the university of alabama and the perilous path of higher education in the reconstruction south william warren rogers jr traces this incredible yet little known story of the bitter contest for the fate of a cultural citadel in relation to the histories of other public universities in the former states of the confederacy as they struggled to make their own way after the war*

*loyal americans marched off to war in 1861 not to conquer the south but to liberate it so argues elizabeth r varon in armies of deliverance a sweeping narrative of the civil war and a bold new interpretation of union and confederate war aims northerners imagined the war as a crusade to deliver the southern masses from slaveholder domination and to bring democracy prosperity and education to the region as the war escalated lincoln and his allies built the case that emancipation would secure military victory and benefit the north and south alike the theme of deliverance was essential in mobilizing a unionist coalition of northerners and anti confederate southerners confederates fighting to establish an independent slaveholding republic were determined to preempt discredit and silence yankee appeals to the southern masses in their quest for political unity confederates relentlessly played up two themes northern barbarity and southern victimization casting the union army as ruthless conquerors confederates argued that the emancipation of blacks was synonymous with the subjugation of the white south interweaving military and social history varon shows that everyday acts on the ground from the flight of slaves to protests against the draft the plundering of civilian homes and civilian defiance of military occupation reverberated at the highest levels of government varon also offers new perspectives on major battles illuminating how soldiers and civilians alike coped with the physical and emotional toll of the war as it grew into a massive humanitarian crisis the union s politics of deliverance helped it to win the war but such appeals failed to convince confederates to accept peace on the victor s terms ultimately sowing the seeds of postwar discord armies of deliverance offers innovative insights on the conflict for those steeped in civil war history and novices alike*

born into slavery in rural louisiana rose herera was bought and sold several times before being purchased by the de hart family of new orleans still a slave she married and had children who also became the property of the de harts but after union forces captured new orleans in 1862 during the american civil war herera s owners fled to havana taking three of her small children with them beyond freedom s reach is the true story of one woman s quest to rescue her children from bondage in a gripping meticulously researched account adam rothman lays bare the mayhem of emancipation during and after the civil war just how far the rights of freed slaves extended was unclear to black and white people alike and so when mary de hart returned to new orleans in 1865 to visit friends she was surprised to find herself taken into custody as a kidnapper the case of rose herera s abducted children made its way through new orleans courts igniting a custody battle that revealed the prospects and limits of justice during reconstruction rose herera s perseverance brought her children s plight to the attention of members of the u s senate and state department who turned a domestic conflict into an international scandal beyond freedom s reach is an unforgettable human drama and a poignant reflection on the tangled politics of slavery and the hazards faced by so many americans on the hard road to freedom

there is no greater truth about ourselves than the past we have uncovered it was time to acknowledge our loved ones who were captured bound and herded to other lands and stripped of their birthright it was time for my family to open that door and embrace this part of our past weslynn allen refuses to sit silently as her family legacy becomes forever hidden in family members gone and almost forgotten initiated by an enlightening conversation with her father weslynn realizes the keys to the past lies solely within her generation she takes on the challenge and years of research takes her far from the low country lifestyle spanish moss covered oak trees and vast marshlands in her hometown of savannah to pinpoint family histories farther than her beloved south following the desire to discover her heritage weslynn s inquiries lead her from the back roads of georgia to the rice fields of south carolina and ultimately to africa within the pages of censuses and helpful interviews with family members a bloodline is found promising the allen s birthright will be told produced as a labor of love from slave trade to a bright future weslynn documents the beautiful branches of a family tree that was almost lost follow her blueprint in trace

in this sequel to his landmark study historian peter kolchin compares the transition to freedom after american emancipation with the russian great reforms the two largest transitions from unfree to free labor of the many that occurred in europe and the americas during the nineteenth century took place in the united states and in russia both occurred in the 1860s and in both the former slaves and serfs strove to maximize their autonomy and freedom while the former masters worked to preserve as many of their prerogatives as possible both were partially but only partially successful in this magisterial and long awaited work historian peter kolchin shows that a more radical break with the past was possible in the united states than in russia with the southern freedpeople coming to enjoy republican citizenship whereas russian peasants remained subjects rather than citizens both countries saw conservative reactions triumph in the late nineteenth century while this conservatism was common in most emancipations it was especially strong in russia and the american south in part as a reaction against the major efforts to restructure the social order that went by the name of reconstruction in the united states and the great reforms in russia

a sweeping history of the lower mississippi valley and its central role in abolishing slavery in the american south

freedom s soldiers tells the story of the 200 000 black men who fought in the civil war in their own words and those of eyewitnesses

in the spring of 1915 chicagoans elected the city s first black alderman oscar de priest in a city where african americans made up less than five percent of the voting population and in a nation that dismissed and denied black political participation de priest s victory was astonishing it did not however surprise the unruly group of black activists who had been working for several decades to win representation on the city

*council freedom s ballot is the history of three generations of african american activists the ministers professionals labor leaders clubwomen and entrepreneurs who transformed twentieth century urban politics this is a complex and important story of how black political power was institutionalized in chicago in the half century following the civil war margaret garb explores the social and political fabric of chicago revealing how the physical makeup of the city was shaped by both political corruption and racial empowerment in ways that can still be seen and felt today*

*the civil war thrust millions of men and women rich and poor soldiers and civilians enslaved and free onto the roads of the south during four years of war southerners lived on the move in the hands of yael a sternhell movement becomes a radically new means to perceive the full trajectory of the confederacy s rise struggle and ultimate defeat by focusing not only on the battlefield and the home front but also on the roads and woods that connected the two this pioneering book investigates the many roles of bodies in motion we watch battalions of young men as they march to the front galvanizing small towns along the way creating the confederate nation in the process we follow deserters straggling home and refugees fleeing enemy occupation both hoping to escape the burdens of war and in a landscape turned upside down we see slaves running toward freedom whether hundreds of miles away or just beyond the plantation s gate based on a vast array of documents from slave testimonies to the papers of confederate bureaucrats to the private letters of travelers from all walks of life sternhell unearths the hidden connections between physical movements and their symbolic meanings individual bodies and entire armies the reinvention of a social order and the remaking of private lives movement as means of liberation and as vehicle of subjugation lay at the heart of the human condition in the wartime south*

*a social and transnational history of black abolitionism in brazil freedom s horizon is a transnational history of black abolitionism in brazil in the last country to abolish slavery in the western hemisphere enslaved and free africans and their descendants crafted their visions of liberation by thinking comparatively about the uneven spread of abolition across the atlantic world between the 1840s and 1860s they acted on the idea that the end of slavery anywhere placed freedom on the horizon in brazil thus they pursued alliances with british diplomats rose in arms at the sight of both union and confederate warships off brazil s atlantic coast sought free soil at foreign consulates on ships and in maroon settlements called quilombos and organized uprisings for immediate abolition after learning of international emancipation struggles in the newspapers isadora moura mota shows that through flight marronage rebellion and literacy practices enslaved and freed peoples in brazil developed a geopolitical imagination in dialogue with the british campaign against the slave trade banned in brazil in 1850 french antislavery the haitian revolution the us civil war and the triple alliance war 1865 1870 in south america traditionally historical research has focused on the 1870s and 1880s when abolition emerged as brazil s first national mass political movement ultimately leading to the outlawing of slavery in 1888 by turning attention to earlier decades and to the role of literacy in the associational lives of afro brazilians freedom s horizon reveals that abolitionism was more than just the cause of north atlantic reformers latin american modernizing elites or middle class advocates it was a grassroots movement that originated in the social and conceptual worlds of the enslaved and connected to a hemispheric black radical tradition*

and valuable economic interest in the nation by 1850 calvin schermerhorn charts changes in the family lives of enslaved americans exploring the broader processes of nation building in the united states growth and intensification of national and international markets the institutionalization of chattel slavery and the growing relevance of race in the politics and society of the republic in chapters organized chronologically schermerhorn argues that american economic development relied upon african americans social reproduction while simultaneously destroying their intergenerational cultural continuity he explores the personal narratives of enslaved people and develops themes such as politics economics labor literature rebellion and social conditions

a telling reevaluation of african american roles in government and law during reconstruction at freedom s door rescues from obscurity the identities images and long term contributions of black leaders who helped to rebuild and reform south carolina after the civil war in seven essays the contributors to the volume explore the role of african americans in government and law during reconstruction in the palmetto state bringing into focus a legacy not fully recognized the contributors collectively demonstrate the legal acumen displayed by prominent african americans and the impact these individuals had on the enactment of substantial constitutional reforms many of which though abandoned after reconstruction would be resurrected in the twentieth century james lowell underwood in a reexamination of the constitutional convention of 1868 recounts the critical role african american delegates played in the drafting of the state s first truly democratic constitution in a pair of essays j clay smith and belinda gergel offer much new biographical information about joseph jasper wright the first african american to serve on a state supreme court bench they discuss wright s jurisprudence approach to judicial decision making role in the dual government controversy of 1876 and coerced resignation from the court in essays that explore the role of african american attorneys in south carolina w lewis burke considers an all but forgotten phase in the history of the university of south carolina law school the education and graduation of black students in the 1870s and john oldfield sheds light on a law school administered by and for african americans in post reconstruction south carolina michael mounter tells the story of richard t greener the first african american graduate of harvard and the first african american professor at the university of south carolina the eminent reconstruction historian eric foner opens and concludes the volume by placing in national perspective the lives of these african americans and the events in which they participated

although it isn t the official national anthem america may be the most important and interesting patriotic song in our national repertoire sweet freedom s song my country tis of thee and democracy in america is a celebration and critical exploration of the complicated musical cultural and political roles played by the song america over the past 250 years popularly known as my country tis of thee and as god save the king queen before that this tune has a history as rich as the country it extols in sweet freedom s song robert branham and stephen hartnett chronicle this song s many incarnations over the centuries colonial americans southern slaveowners abolitionists temperance campaigners and labor leaders among others appropriated and adapted the tune to create anthems for their own struggles because the song has been invoked by nearly every grassroots movement in american history the story of america offers important insights on the story of democracy in the united states an examination of america as a historical artifact and cultural text sweet freedoms song is a reflection of the rebellious spirit of americans throughout our nations history the late robert james branham and his collaborator stephen hartnett have produced a thoroughly researched delightfully written book that will appeal to scholars and patriots of all stripes

original and revelatory david blight author of frederick douglass every o craven award finalist a civil war memory civil war monitor best book of the year in april 1865 robert e lee wrote to ulysses s grant asking for peace peace was beyond his authority to negotiate grant replied but surrender terms he would discuss the distinction proved prophetic after appomattox reveals that the civil war did not end with confederate capitulation in 1865 instead a second phase of the war began which lasted until 1871 not the project euphemistically called reconstruction but a state of genuine belligerence whose mission was to shape the peace using its war powers the u s army oversaw an ambitious occupation stationing tens of thousands of troops in outposts across the defeated south this groundbreaking history shows that the purpose of the occupation was to crush slavery in the face of fierce and violent resistance but there were limits to its effectiveness the occupying army never really managed to remake the south the united states army has been far too neglected as a player a force in the history of reconstruction downs wants his work to speak to the present and indeed it should david w blight the atlantic striking downs chronicles a military occupation that was indispensable to the uprooting of slavery boston globe downs makes the case that the final end to slavery and the establishment of basic civil and voting rights for all americans was born in the face of bayonets a remarkable necessary book slate

established by congress in early 1865 the bureau of refugees freedmen and abandoned lands more commonly known as the freedmen s bureau assumed the herculean task of overseeing the transition from slavery to
